1. Jesus is condemned

The planet is condemned by human actions

2. Jesus is handed his cross

People made poor suffer the most



Millions in the third world countries have a difficult cross of poverty to carry, especially in lands devastated by war and conflict. We are not faced with two separate crises, one ecological and the other social, but rather one complex crisis which is both social and ecological.

The cry of the poor and the cry of the planet made poor are inseparable. It is our lifestyle which places a heavy burden on the Earth and on the poor.

3. Jesus falls the first time Water ecosystems are collapsing



The magnificent cycle of life-giving water connects all of life on our planet. Of the three planetary resources – land, air and water – Pope Francis focuses extensively on the issue of water.

2.5 billion people in the world lack access to safe water and basic sanitation. Our apathy for conversing water is threatening life almost everywhere. Our water bodies are flowing and filled with poisons.

Chant:

4. Joining with Mary, Simon, Veronica In solidarity with the planet made poor



Despite the challenges, in every corner of the planet there are today many people of good will who are courageously and actively coming forward to care for our common home and halt the climate crisis.

We too are invited to co-partner in Christ's present mission to care for our planet. The way each of us does it may vary. Mary, Simon and Veronica reached out to Jesus differently. Though our mission is the same, our own resourcefulness and interests will shape how we can be earth's guardians.

5. Jesus falls the second time Land ecosystems are collapsing




The external deserts in the world are growing, because the internal deserts have become so vast. Internally we are hollow and dry and that's reflects in our outer world.

6. Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem Weeping for the future generations






We gently expand our imagination to see our breath mutually exchanged with trees and plant life, Expanding again we become aware of how our breath connects us to the entire life matrix of the planet.
