Introduction:

In Catholic tradition, St. Joachim and St. Anne, (*The parents of the Virgin Mary*) and St. Joseph and the Virgin Mary, the earthly parents of Jesus, hold a revered place. Their lives and roles as parents and grandparents provide profound insights into Christian parenting, offering timeless values and virtues to emulate. They serve as models for creating a home where faith and love are central, fostering an environment where children learn to prioritize their relationship with God.

The role of Christian Parents is crucial in nurturing a household that reflects God's love and teachings. By supporting each other in love and respect, sharing responsibilities, and providing spiritual, disciplinary, and emotional guidance to their children, parents can fulfil their God-given mandate. As co-creators, Parents participate in God's creative work. Nurturing life in Christian family extends beyond physical care; it involves teaching by example, fostering an environment where faith is lived out through daily actions and interactions. The role of parents as nurturers also includes the stewardship of the family as a domestic Church, a place where God's love and grace are experienced and shared. By cultivating a home grounded in Christian principles, parents help to shape a supportive and faith-filled community that mirrors the larger body of Christ.

Scripture Reading: Lk 2: 43 -52

Reflection: The humility and obedience of Jesus to His earthly parents is most clearly demonstrated in the Gospel of Luke, "Then he went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them; his mother treasured all these things in her heart" (Lk 2:51). This single verse encapsulates a significant aspect of Jesus' earthly ministry in obedience to the will of the Father and his willingness to submit to human authority, even as the divine Son of God. We can reflect on the passage under the following heads:

<u>Fulfilling the law:</u> By an act of obedience to his earthly Parents, Jesus fulfils the law of God, "Honour your father and your mother" (Ex 20:12).

Model of Righteous Living: By obedience, Jesus provides a model for all believers. In Colossians, Paul instructs children to "obey your parents in everything, for this pleases the Lord" (Col 3:20,). Jesus' life serves as the ultimate example for Christian's conduct, demonstrating that true righteousness involves humility and submission, not only to God but also to those God has placed in authority over us.

<u>Virtue of Obedience:</u> Jesus' example teaches believers the virtue of obedience within the family structure. This is a countercultural message in a world that often prizes individual autonomy over communal harmony. Jesus' willingness to be subject to His parents challenges us to rethink our understanding of authority and submission, emphasizing the spiritual maturity that comes from humble obedience.

<u>Sanctity of Family Life:</u> Jesus' obedient participation in the family life the Holy Family, elevates the sanctity of the family. It suggests that the family is not merely a social construct but a divine institution where God's will is lived out daily. The ordinary life of the family becomes a sacred space where holiness can be cultivated through daily acts of love, respect, and obedience.

<u>Embracing God's will:</u> Jesus' submission to His parents culminates in His ultimate submission to the Father's will, in the Garden of Gethsemane where He prays, "*Not my will, but yours be done"* inviting all believers to embrace obedience as a spiritual discipline, honouring the sanctity of family, and preparing our hearts for greater submission to God's will.
