"Let the Children Come to Me"

Hymn: (O Sacrament most Holy or any other hymn of adoration and praise)

Introductory:
The Eucharist is the great school of childlike trust in the Master. Before the mystery of God's love, we too are children—small, dependent, yet incredibly loved. To adore the Eucharistic Lord, is to rest before a presence where our hearts and soul feel at home; to trust, to let go of our burdens. In His gaze, we rediscover our lost joy and peace we were created with. The Lord once took little children into his arms and blessed them, saying, "Let the children come to Me, do not hinder them, for the Kingdom of Heaven belongs to such as these." This Holy Hour, we bring before to the Lord, all our children and the children of the world—those in our families, parishes, schools, streets, and villages. We lift in prayer especially those whose joy and innocence are stolen by the pressures of our modern culture, unhealthy competition, war, violence, and early exposure to what is not life-giving. We also ask the Lord to rekindle a childhood quality that might enable us to love all and be loved in return.

Invocation to the Eucharistic Presence
Lord Jesus, You who grew in wisdom and grace, nurture the minds and hearts of our children with goodness. You who welcomed the little ones, embrace those who feel abandoned, unloved, or pressured. You who calmed the storm, bring peace to the restless spirit of children wounded by neglect, abuse, or exploitation. Open our eyes, Lord, to treasure every child as a gift from You.
Teach us to protect their innocence and to guard their dreams. Fill families, schools, and communities with the warmth of love and patience, so that no child may feel forgotten, silenced, or burdened beyond their years. May every child grow under Your gaze, safe in Your embrace, and learn to smile with the freedom of those who know they are deeply loved. Amen.

Prayer to the Holy Spirit before Scripture Reading:

Come Holy Spirit, and make our minds and hearts a fertile ground for the seed of Your Word. May we welcome Your truth without resistance. May Your Word awaken in us, a desire to follow Christ more faithfully. Prepare us to listen, to ponder, and to live the Word with humility, love, and courage. Amen.

Scripture reading: Mark 10:13–16

Reflections:

Jesus never considered children a distraction from His mission. Even when the crowd pressed upon Him with urgent needs, He stopped, took time, and made space for little ones. He did not merely tolerate their presence—He *welcomed* them with affection, drawing them into His arms and blessing them tenderly. Jesus gave Children the dignity, showing that the Kingdom belongs to them. His touch and embrace reveal a God who values not only the strong and capable, but also the small, the dependent, and the fragile. For Jesus, no ministry was too important, no journey too urgent, to pause and give love to a child.

Childhood is meant to be a season of laughter, curiosity, play, and freedom. Yet how often do we see children today burdened with adult-like anxieties? Pressured by endless competitions, overloaded with expectations, exposed too early to violence, consumerism, and digital addictions, their joy fades into stress. Jesus calls children "the greatest in the Kingdom" not because of their innocence alone, but because they live in trust, dependence, and openness. We, as parents, educators, elders, and society, sometimes forget that children need space to simply *be children*. We must ask forgiveness before the Eucharistic Jesus, for the times we became a burden rather than a blessing to our children.

For they have their own thoughts.
You may house their bodies but not their souls,
For their souls dwell in the house of tomorrow,
Which you cannot visit, not even in your dreams.
You may strive to be like them, but seek not to make them like you."

General Intercessions:

For parents and educators—that they may not burden children with unhealthy pressures or those of their own unfulfilled dreams but form them in love, wisdom, and faith. *Lord, hear our prayer*.

For the schools, where our children spend the greater part of their day in the company of peers, teachers, and elders: that these places may be true homes of learning, respect, friendship, and growth. *Let us pray to the Lord*.

For each of us—that we may recover the lost spirit of childlike wonder, joy and trust in God's providence. *Lord, hear our prayer*.
